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Building in Grace by Rory McClure

God's grace is both the most wonderful part of our Christian faith as well as the most mysterious. Grace is the pure, undeserved love of God. It is the basis of His character and the only thing that motivates Him to save us, which makes it the core of the gospel.

When Peter addressed the Jerusalem counsel. he said, "We believe it is through the grace of our Lord Jesus that we are saved" (Acts 15:11). Paul tells us that "we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand." (Romans 5:2). He explains further, "And if by grace, then it is no longer by works; if it were, grace would no longer be grace." (Romans 11:6)

This is the most beautiful thing about grace. Because it is "no longer by works" we are set free from feeling we haven't done enough. Since it is a free gift, given by a loving and generous God, we simply have to receive it

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and it is ours. The core of the gospel is that Jesus "suffered death, so that by the grace of God He might taste death for everyone." (Hebrews 2:9). While we had failed God and not only felt ashamed that we'd failed ourselves, our loved ones and our God.

God took this shame and nailed it to the cross. Jesus, the only one who didn't deserve death, the only one who genuinely had nothing to be ashamed of because He never sinned, took all our shame onto Himself as He died on the cross.

The burden was too great for us, the consequences were too severe for us and so Christ graciously chose to bear that burden on our behalf. He "tasted death" for us, so that we would be spared its bitterness.

Now, "having been justified by His grace, we [have] become heirs having the hope of eternal life." (Titus 3:7). Once we were legally guilty before God but now God has found a just way of showing mercy. Rather than giving us what we deserve, His grace has

motivated Him to give us what we don't deserve; forgiveness. Yet the penalty must still be paid or God would cease to be just. So God the Son volunteered to pay the penalty we ought to have paid. He went to the cross to pay that penalty and now both the justice and mercy of God have been satisfied and we, in turn, have been justified.

Frustratingly, we don't naturally enjoy all the blessings of grace. Some of us are overwhelmed by God's grace from the moment we first believed, but over time our delight in God has waned. For others of us, we've struggled to accept God's complete forgiveness. From God's perspective, we have fully received all of His grace, love and acceptance from the moment we first believed. The problem is, our experience of this changes from time to

time and from person to person. That's why Paul told Timothy, "You then, my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus." (2 Timothy 2:1). Peter also tells us to "grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." (2 Peter 3:18).

...now both the justice and mercy of God have been satisfied and we, in turn, have been justified.

In other words, God has given us the responsibility to grow in grace and to become stronger in grace.

How do we do this? Paul told the Ephesian elders, "Now I commit you to God and to the word of His grace, which can

build you up and give you an inheritance among all those who are sanctified." (Acts 20:32). Isn't that a beautiful term for the Bible? "The word of God's grace." The Bible has to be the fountain where we refresh ourselves in God's grace, but no fountain has ever built anything. Nor can drinking from a fountain make you stronger. Just as you go to a building site if you want to build and you go to the gym if you want to get stronger, the Bible must become our building site and our gym. The Bible gives us the blueprints of life that we have to follow if He is going to be our "architect and builder" (Heb. 11:10)

If you've ever had the builders in your home, you'll know that building can be a dirty and sweaty business. Old stuff needs to be knocked down and the rubble needs to be

removed. New materials need to be brought in, mixed up and then they need to be built up according to the plan. If you've worked on a building site, you'll know that the architect often specifies how the site is to be levelled and drained before the building can even begin. In the same way, if you're trying to be built up in grace, you often have to get rid of all the rubbish that is going to prevent further building.

One of the most frequent forms of debris in our lives that prevents our building in grace is hurt from previous relationships. This most obviously comes if you've had a father who has deeply hurt you in some way. For most people, the deeper the hurt a bad father has inflicted, the harder it is for them to experience the true love and forgiveness of their heavenly Father.

Similarly, harsh or absent mothers, or other abusive relationships can prevent you being built up in grace. That is why Jesus taught us to pray, "forgive us our trespasses (sins) as we forgive those who trespass against us."

While you might have a very real reason to grieve over the pain a parent may have inflicted on you, the more you allow bitterness to grow in your soul, the more unstable rubble is going to get in the way of you enjoying God's grace. The only way to clear out that rubble is through forgiveness.

Forgiveness can help us to rethink things.

Normally, the deeper the pain, the greater the betrayal and the younger you were when it happened, the deeper and greater the damage. Perhaps you were so young you were utterly incapable of being aware of experiencing anything other than the betrayal, abuse of trust and the pain it caused you. However, with age and experience, together with an increasing awareness of what God has forgiven you, comes an ability to imagine things from another perspective.

Many people have found it helpful to try to imagine what awful things happened in the past of their abuser that led them to do those evil things. Realising that the cruel parent was once the child and victim of their cruel parents, then imagining how that twisted and hurt them

throughout their lives
has helped some people
to forgive. Slowly, the all
powerful monster of
their childhood
memories is turned into
a weak, pitiable person
who is no longer strong
enough to continue to
inflict the same
psychological hurt as
they once did.

Another source of rubbish that can block your ability to build yourself up in grace, is believing rubbish. For example, if you falsely believe that God isn't in control and therefore can't answer your prayers, or that God is in control but is too mean to answer your prayers, you are never going to enjoy the grace of God. However, if you have real hope in God's power, and a real understanding that God may ask you to carry a cross for a time, you'll come to understand God more like Paul came to understand Him. After

Paul struggled for a time with a "thorn in the side" God said to him, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." And Paul's reaction was to say, "Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest

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on me." (2 Corinthians 12:9).

Paul also told us to "be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus." (2 Timothy 2:1). So the Bible also works like a gym for our mind and our faith. That means that while some parts of

the Bible are easy, some parts are hard, and the hard parts are there to make you stronger. If you go to the gym you could injure yourself or you could do as little as possible or you could just give up because it is too hard or too boring. But if you do any of these things you could never hope to become stronger. That's why God gives us enough easy parts in the Bible to keep us spiritually fit and enough hard parts to help us to grow stronger.

Two things work for us in the gym and in the Bible; do it regularly and build up slowly. Start with the New Testament and with some of the easier Psalms. Read them on a regular basis. Schedule it into your daily and weekly routine and start with short readings and work up to longer ones. When these become familiar, work on some of the harder parts of the Bible and

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when you get stuck get yourself a study Bible that will help you understand what you are reading. Also, ask your pastor or people in your home-group if you don't understand something. Equally important is to pray and ask God to help you.

We are greedy consumers and the more food we eat or commodities we buy the more rubbish accumulates

Tearfund have seen the effect of climate change around the world and how dumping and burying rubbish is destroying the environment and leading to disease, and poverty. This concern led Tearfund to promote a "Rubbish Campaign" last year to encourage us to think seriously about how we can cut down on the number of plastic

bags, cups and bottles we use. There was even a petition to a wellknown company who manufacture millions of plastic drink bottles.

How does this relate to the Christian faith and the Bible's teaching?

Reading the first few chapters of Genesis gives us the answer: The world and all creation belongs to God and we are called to be stewards; to look after the animals, the land and the sea. Adam found great satisfaction looking after creation and it is our responsibility to keep the earth clean and productive.

Greed, covetousness, pride, selfishness and laziness all contribute to the state of our world today as people live in the present and forget that future generations will be living on this planet.

Amazing Grace by Romayne Brett

Bad Boy Comes Good


Have you ever pondered the story behind the words of the famous hymn "Amazing Grace" by John Newton? The full details are too many to mention in this article, but what an amazing testimony of God's literal Amazing Grace!

John Newton's tombstone reads, "John Newton, Clerk, once an infidel and libertine, a servant of slaves in Africa, was, by the rich mercy of our LORD and SAVIOUR JESUS CHRIST, preserved, restored, pardoned, and appointed to preach the faith he had long laboured to destroy. Near 16 years as Curate of this parish and 28 years as Rector of St Mary Woolnoth."

John Newton was born in 1725 in Wapping, London, to a Christian

mother, whose desire was for him to become a clergyman. Sadly, she died of TB when Newton was seven. Age 11, he went to work at sea with his father, under the merchant navy captain, losing his first job because of "unsettled behaviour and impatience of restraint". He rebelled against the Royal Navy and deserted. Caught, put in irons and flogged, humiliated, Newton considered murdering the Captain and committing suicide by throwing himself overboard.

He was discharged to a slave ship, working for a slave trader who treated Newton with cruelty. He was rescued by a sea captain who had known his father and Newton became captain of his own ship, working as a slave trader.



The life of slave trading was barbaric. Ships would voyage from England and anchor off the African coast. Tribal chiefs would deliver men and women captured in raids and war, to sell. Buyers would barter in exchange for weapons, alcohol, jewellery etc; the slaves would then be loaded aboard ship, flogged, chained below deck to prevent suicide, packed in like sardines with up to 600 slaves.

Often, with outbreaks of disease, they were thrown overboard. The remaining slaves were

then taken and traded for sugar and molasses to make rum, which ships would then bring to England. Then the "Triangle Trade" would be repeated.

At some point on his travels, Newton found a book, "Imitation of Christ" by Thomas a Kempis, which was to eventually lead to his conversion.

In 1747, he worked on a ship "The Greyhound." Sailors were renowned for coarse manners but Newton's exceeded theirs and shocked even them; he was known as "The Great Blasphemer" known for rampant sexual immorality, profanity, drunkenness and debauchery.

It was on this ship, that a raging North Atlantic storm took place with little hope of survival, hence sailors worked the pumps hard to stay afloat. After several days, Newton was too

exhausted to pump so was tied to the helm for 11 hours to hold the ship on course. Newton came to the reality that his life was as turbulent and troubled as the storms and ship. With his life at risk, he recalled the words from that book, struck by a passage in

"Lord, have mercy on us!"

Proverbs, "Because I have called and ye have refused... I also will laugh at your calamity... when your fear cometh as desolation and your destruction cometh as a whirlwind; when distress and anguish come upon you. Then shall they call upon Me, but I will not answer." Proverbs 1:24-31

Believing he was too

much a sinner to be forgiven, he cried out, "Lord have mercy upon us" and survived, believing that God had addressed him through the storm and that God's grace had been bestowed on him. Newton recalled, "On that day the Lord sent from on high and delivered me out of deep waters." He called it his "great deliverance."

For the rest of his life, he observed 10 March 1748, as the day of his conversion, when he humbled himself to Jesus. This is reflected in the words of his famous hymn, "Amazing grace! ...that saved a wretch like me... how precious did that grace appear the hour I first believed... thro' many dangers, toils and snares, I have already come; 'tis grace has brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home."

For a while, he

continued in slave trading, trying to improve the conditions of slaves under his care. After this John Newton went on to lead a completely reformed life for the Gospel of Christ. He married in 1750 to Mary, whom he dearly loved and they adopted his two orphaned nieces. He suffered a severe stroke in 1754, and took the job of tide surveyor at Liverpool. However, he felt called to the ministry. He studied Latin, Hebrew etc and was eventually ordained into the Church of England as Curate of Olney where he served for 16 years until becoming Rector of St Mary Woolnoth Church, London, fulfilling his dear mother's prayers and greatest desire. In 1764, aged 39 years, he commenced 43 years of ministry.

In Olney, for his parishioners and evening services, Newton often

composed a hymn to reflect the Scripture for the evening. In 1779, 280 of these were collected by poet and fellow parishioner, William Cowper and combined with 68 hymns of his own were published as "Olney"

Thank You Lord for Your amazing grace!

Hymns", the most famous being, "Faith's Review and Expectation" arising from 1 Chronicles 17:16-17; this we know as "Amazing Grace"!

Other well known Olney hymns are "How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds" and "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken."

So detailed and rich is Newton's life after his conversion, one can only skim the surface here. He became renowned for his pastoral care, hospitality and helping the poor. He aligned himself with the Evangelical Revival, influenced by and supporting his friend John Wesley and Methodism. In 1788. Newton published a pamphlet, "Thoughts Upon the Slave Trade" detailing the horrific conditions, and apologised for his life within that business, "a confession which... comes too late... will always be humiliating to me, that I was once active in a business at which my heart now shudders" which he sent to every MP.

So influential was he, that well-known social figures sought his counsel, one of notable prominence, was William Wilberforce MP

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who had a Christian conversion and considered leaving Parliament. Newton encouraged William Wilberforce to stay and serve God where he was. Together they campaigned to abolish the African slave trade which resulted in the Slave Trade Act 1807,

which enacted this event.

Newton's wife Mary, died in 1790. He was plagued with ill health and died in 1807, aged 82 years, buried beside his wife. The town of Newton in Sierra Leone is named after him. In 1982, he was recognised by the Gospel Music Association for his

hymns and inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame. His legacy lives on through many films, plays, musicals and books. And of course, through our own praise and worship! What a legacy!
